Club member Mark Kucera attended Wildacres retreat recently and provided the following report for us. It sounds like a really neat place to go to learn new skills in a beautiful, relaxing setting. Prior to this account by Mark I confess to not having really given the idea of going there much real thought but after reading Mark's report. Here it is:

I spent another great week at Wildacres from 4-10 September. Wildacres is the retreat in the mountains of North Carolina near Asheville where the Eastern Federation offers lapidary and jewelry classes. The classes are introductory and intermediate, you can walk in knowing nothing. The tools, equipment and supplies are provided. There is typically a materials fee depending on the class in addition to the current \$410 tuition fee. Room and board are included with the tuition.

The instructors are great, the class size is low enough that plenty of personal attention is available. The accommodations, food and camaraderie are top notch. This was the second time I attended. I'll likely continue going many more years until I've attended everything they have to offer.
