

### Recap of show: Bill deLorraine


Mineral Kits for Kids -282 distributed (there is one box left of egg cartons)

**60** kids for the fluorescent hunt- Dino. All long wave lights this year. LW is easier on the eyes.

We need more fluorite for next year. Dino tumbled lots of the minerals for the kids to make them smoother to handle. Advantage of LW lights: there are no batteries to purchase. Need to order one box of egg cartons for next year.

Approximately **282** kids got mineral kits!

Attendance down a little We heard from many vendors that attendance at many of the shows this year was down.

On the bright side though: Most of our vendors did well or at least "OK" to fairly well. Bill and Joanna canvassed almost all of our vendors. One club member, via live stream, wrote that their experience contrasted with ours in that there were some vendors reporting to her that they "did not do well".

## Suggestions for Next Year's 58<sup>th</sup> Annual Show

Increase admission adults to \$5.00 (\$1.00 going to wire wrapping) and anticipated Pavilion rental fee increase 2025.

Vendor Fees increase? Was not talked about.

T-shirts: Order more larger size T-shirts (2X, 3X), and fewer "large".

Order more V-neck ladies T-shirts all sizes esp. 2X and 3X.

Mark brought up getting quotes from other shirt vendors; Heather said she would get quotes. She also said in her opinion the white print on the back of the T-shirts was not visible. Bill noted that online pre-production previews of black lettered versions vs white lettered versions showed that black letters on this background color were even less legible.

Barb asked about ¾ length T-shirt sleeves. There has been no motion brought up for this yet.

Heather also asked why she did not get notification about vendors advertising on the back of the shirts. Bill said because "that is in the contract you signed and you did not choose to". Heather mentioned that we must have lost money on the T-shirts. Joanna said "No, not really". We have lots of them left to sell and we still have tote bags to sell. (The tote bags are included in the T-shirt invoice). Melisssa said we paid \$1,156.25 for the T-shirts and brought in \$774.00, the difference being \$382.25. Joanna said we still have these left to sell. Also, the shirts give great advertising for our show. We have never had a loss on them.


### Sandy suggested:

- 1) A floor poster for the wire wrapping floor space.
- 2) Tri-folds for tables (we email planograms to each vendor prior to their arrival every year)
  - 3) Bracelets for kids, maybe stamps
- 4) Display different types of minerals found on field trips at front table with club sign-up forms or, alternatively, at another table near Dave Millis' wire wrapping space...
- 5) Have Show Helper sheets available who signed up, time slots, etc. (There was a worker's schedule at the registration table).

Members noted that lady's V-neck T shirts were smaller fitting this year. Joanna said yes, prospective customers were appraised of this. The T-shirts were from the same company that we have always ordered them from. Joanna will check into it.

Members mentioned that vehicles were blocking the way for other vendors to get in the Pavilion and unload. Also, there was oil left on the floor and one truck left running with a definite gas smell. Megan, the manager of the pavilion mentioned the leak and was not too happy about it.

Preston said maybe we should add to the application form that vehicles must be shut off

after entering the pavilion while loading and unloading. Melissa said maybe not let vendors drive in the pavilion. (Not a viable option) ... Others said you must drive in to unload. Preston intoned, maybe set a time limit an hour or hour and half. Bill recommended reversing the traffic flow, as Megan, the pavilion manager told him, (for the first time), "it is easier that way to navigate turns". Bill will investigate condensing the unused space in the middle of the arena that separates the aisles of vendors so there is more room at both end corners for vehicles to make turns, particularly those vehicles pulling trailers. The entrance where the large white truck is parked is a particularly tight spot. That way making all happy. Bill will add language to next year's "Opening Day Welcome Letter to Vendors" about not leaving vehicles running when setting up. It seemed to be a matter of common sense, but we'll leave nothing to chance moving forward.

Barry noted that he is bothered by carbon monoxide from engines running and has been poisoned by it. Also, that there was a large fan on the other side of the arena that was not being used that he spoke to Meghan about.

Sandy suggested that on the vendor form we ask if vendors need help unloading or loading so as to speed up those processes. There were people and young adults there who did help vendors with this at our show this year. And we believe it helped a lot.

Bob noted that the megaphone did not work well. Could not make out what the announcers were saying. (Check battery levels before use!)

Mark McKenna said that there is a speaker system that is up high above the floor. Bill noted that it is hard to get to and very hot up there. Mabe a karaoke mike next year instead of megaphone. (or replace the old batteries in

the megaphone...) To Mark's point, It might be well worth our while to <u>bring a fan upstairs</u> and use that system instead of either megaphone or karaoke, because that system is superior.

Heather asked about having another vendor who could provide hamburgs and hotdogs instead of, or in addition to, the meals. Kids just like them better. (We can check first with Morgan's about doing this)


Preston asked about the club cooking their own homburgs and hotdogs. We will check with Morgans to see if they can provide hamburgers and hot dogs next year.

Heather enquired about lunch gift certificates for show helpers, asking "why only some workers got them". Joanna explained that they were only a very few and they were those who went "over and above". There is a Show Helper member who comes from NYC each year, donates monetarily, and is the last one to leave at the end of the show after moving tables and chairs off the show floor. There are others as well who contribute "over and above". Joanna reminded Heather of the plaques that former President, Skyler gave out for members who contributed similarly. Heather said she was "just asking".

Heather asked about advertising, if we had "done enough" this year. Bill answered "Yes" we did. Joanna will send her the extensive list of who we advertised with. Joanna noted the advertising budget is \$700.00 and we went over again this year. A little less than half of the budget was advertising in Saranac Lake, where Heather herself suggested.

### **New Business:**

Bill noted that the Buffalo Club will be here on field trips later this week. They are going to

Bush Farm, Powers, Rose Rd., and Macomb. Not sure if we can join them; if anyone interested, please let us know.

Melissa asked if it was ok to use the club's jewelry supplies to present a wire wrapping class to Keisha's girl scouts. Hands were raised in favor.

We talked about the storage shed. Joanna said there is a 10X10 larger spot they are holding for us for \$70.00 a month. Mark McKenna made the motion that we take it and Jerry Curcio 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Staying there, at least for the time being, is much closer to our show site. Jerry made 5 trips taking minerals back after the show. So, the closer our storage is to the show, the better.

Heather said she has a rack that she will donate to the club for use in the new, larger, storage bin space.

James Taylor talked about the Powers field trip during the show. He had thought it was only members who would be going on the trip and had 29-30 attend. So, it was very hard for him to keep track of them all. Bill noted that all our advertisements for the show included the field trip open to the public and that this number was about 3X the norm. Others mentioned maybe having a limit to how many can attend. And James talked about having a list of what they need to bring or wear when collecting. We used to have a list and will reconstruct it to display at the registration table next year and online at our club's website. James mentioned the Bush Farm, he had just heard about it. This is on our list, and has been, of possible sites to go on field trips. The list has been sent to the Field Trip Coordinators who should soon construct a field trip list with dates and meeting times for the rest of this year and 2025. The field trips will be posted in our newsletter along

with the list of what is needed to bring and wear when on them.

Alissa Zeallor won the door prize, a beautiful fluorescent green fluorite crystal grouping.

Meeting adjourned at 7:39 PM Bob Taillon made motion to adjourn, Mark McKenna 2<sup>nd</sup>.

### "Mineral of the Month":

### What is Tourmaline?

Tourmaline is a semi-precious stone that comes in a wide range of colors. It is a mineral classed as crystalline boron silicate wherein boron is associated chemically with elements such as aluminum, iron, magnesium, sodium, lithium, or potassium. and. Tourmaline has a vitreous luster and is part of the trigonal crystal system. It comes in a variety of colors including black, pink, green, purple, rainbow, watermelon, and others. The meaning of Tourmaline is "protection and grounding".

Commonly encountered species and varieties of tourmaline include the following: (From Wikipedia)

- Schorl species
  - Brownish-black to black—schorl

- Dravite species (from the Drave district of <u>Carinthia</u>)
  - Dark yellow to brownishblack—dravite
- <u>Elbaite</u> species (named after the island of Elba, Italy)
  - Red or pinkish-red— <u>rubellite</u> variety
  - Light blue to bluish-green indicolite variety (from indigo)
  - Green—verdelite variety
  - Colorless—achroite variety (from <u>Ancient</u> <u>Greek άχρωμος</u> (ákhrōmos) ' colorless'

This month's "Mineral of the Month", Black
Tourmaline, also known as Schorl, is the
protector of the pack. This stone is all about
shielding you from psychic attacks and keeping
you feeling safe so you can step out into the world
infused with purpose and self-confidence. You can

- Meaning: Tourmaline, often referred to as a "receptive stone," is celebrated for its wide array of colors and its ability to inspire enlightenment, balance, and remove blockages in both the physical and spiritual realms.
- Healing Properties: The crystal is believed to aid in the detoxification process of the human body, promote health and healing, and is associated with the heart chakra, thereby enhancing love, compassion, and tolerance.
- Protection: Tourmaline is renowned for its powerful protective properties, such as shielding the wearer or carrier from negative energies and transforming dense energies into lighter vibrations.
- Usage: It can be used in various forms like jewelry, in meditation, or placed in living

spaces, and is often utilized in tandem with other crystals to amplify its effects and facilitate a deeper spiritual connection.

 Care: While the page does not explicitly detail the care for tourmaline, it is generally advised to cleanse and charge crystals regularly, which can be done through several methods like using moonlight, sunlight., or other means.

Tourmaline is distinguished by its threesided prisms; no other common mineral has three sides. Prisms faces often have heavy vertical striations that produce a rounded triangular effect. See photos below.
